Which methods were used to identify research priorities?

interview; survey

How were the priorities for research identified exactly?

Step 1: collecting research priorities: survey and interviews to identify research priorities needed to transform cancer care. Step 2: data processing: information from survey and interviews collated, results discussed, literature reviewed. Step 3: working groups convened to draft research priorities within each topical area, iterative cycles of peer review and refinement to generate and approve initial draft of the research agenda. Step 4: meeting: to collect feedback on draft

Nurses.

How were stakeholders recruited?

ONS members were recruited.

Were stakeholders actively involved or did they just participate?

Stakeholders were mere participants of the research prioritization process; they were not actively involved in the process.
